







A powerful and moving teen graphic novel memoir about immigration, belonging, and how arts can save a life.




GRAPHIC NOVEL BIOGRAPHY TAKAI, G.




TEEN FICTION BERRY, J.


TEEN FICTION CHEE, T.


TEEN FICTION GRATZ, A.

Zofia, a teenage Holocaust survivor, travels across post-war Europe as she searches for her younger brother and seeks to rebuild her shattered life.




TEEN FICTION LEE, M.

Code Name Verity by Elizabeth Wein



A Sitting in St. James by Rita Williams-Garcia




TEEN FICTION LEE, Y.S.


TEEN FICTION LOCKHART, E.

An eighth-grader who dreams of performing in a Broadway musical concocts a plan to run away to New York and audition for the role of Elliot in the musical version of "E.T."






TEEN FICTION LU, M.


TEEN FICTION MEYER, M.


TEEN FICTION SHUSTERMAN, N.
